FOUR DAYS IN NOVEMBER

The responsibility of the American Newspaper to give its readers accurate, swift, and in this case, tragic and appalling news, was never met with greater skill and devotion than on the four days of November 22, 23, 24, and 25, 1963.

Despite the awesome pressure of meeting deadlines under such sorrowful conditions, millions of words poured from reporters' typewriters, thousands of copy editors checked stories they never wanted to see. In the so-called "back shops" of newspapers, large medium and small, linotype operators punched keys which recorded for all to read a story which even the typesetters could hardly believe. Pressmen assembled plates which should never have been needed, and pushed the button which triggered the high whine of a high-speed press.

Deliverers delivered newspapers to newsboys and news merchants who sold them to readers who didn't want to believe the headlines they saw were true.

But they were true.

During those four terrible days, a nation went from stunned disbelief to anger and shame, and despite the orderly and magnificent smoothness with which the Republic transferred the reins of leadership from a fallen president to a new one, a melancholia remained, unhidden on the face of the nation.

The newspapers of the United States during those four days recorded the emotions of the people of the Republic. The job they did is an historic record of one of the world's greatest tragedies. It was a faithful rendition of the facts, as and when they happened. And as such, represents one of the nation's most cherished traditions. A free press is the strength of the Republic.

The following pages are a reproduction of a number of the front pages of those newspapers on those fateful days. They are a collectors' item.

Picked at random and with a belief not unjustified that the greatness of these newspapers would tell their own story, they are here for the record.

We are indebted to Mr. Earl J. Johnson, editor of United Press International, and to all the men and women of the press of the United States, that they are now available in book form to all the people of this country.

Yet he never once faltered in speed and accuracy as he assembled one of the biggest and saddest news stories of his generation.

The Murder of the Young President

Washington, Nov. 23 (UPI)—It was a balmy, sunny noon as we motored through downtown Dallas behind President Kennedy. The procession cleared the center of the business district and turned into a handsome highway that wound through what appeared to be a park.

I was riding in the so-called White House press "pool" car, a telephone company vehicle equipped with a mobile radio-telephone. I was in the front seat between a driver from the telephone company and Malcolm Kilduff, acting White House press secretary for the President's Texas tour. Three other pool reporters were wedged in the back seat.

Suddenly we heard three loud, almost painfully loud cracks. The first sounded as if it might have been a large firecracker. But the second and third blasts were unmistakable. Gunfire.

PRESIDENT'S CAR FALTERED

The President's car, possibly as much as 150 or 200 yards ahead, seemed to falter briefly. We saw a flurry of activity in the Secret Service follow-up car behind the Chief Executive's bubble-top limousine.

Next in line was the car bearing Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson. Behind that, another follow-up car bearing agents assigned to the Vice President's protection. We were behind that car.

Our car stood still for probably only a few seconds, but it seemed like a lifetime. One sees history explode before one's eyes and for even the most trained observer, there is a limit to what one can comprehend.

I looked ahead at the President's car but could not see him or his companion, Gov. John B. Connally of Texas. Both men had been riding on the right side of the bubble-top limousine from Washington. I thought I saw a flash of pink which would have been Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy.

Everybody in our car began shouting at the driver to pull up closer to the President's car. But at this moment, we saw the big bubble-top and a motorcycle escort roar away at high speed.

We screamed at our driver, "Get going, get going." We careened around the Johnson car and its escort and set out down the highway, barely able to keep in sight of the President's car and the accompanying Secret Service follow-up car.

They vanished around a curve. When we cleared

the same curve we could see where we were heading—Parkland Hospital, a large brick structure to the left of the arterial highway. We skidded around a sharp left turn and spilled out of the pool car as it entered the hospital driveway.

PRESIDENT WAS FACE DOWN

I ran to the side of the bubble-top.

The President was face down on the back seat. Mrs. Kennedy made a cradle of her arms around the President's head and bent over him as if she were whispering to him.

Gov. Connally was on his back on the floor of the car, his head and shoulders resting in the arms of his wife, Nellie, who kept shaking her head and shaking with dry sobs. Blood oozed from the front of the Governor's suit. I could not see the President's wound. But I could see blood spattered around the interior of the rear seat and a dark stain spreading down the right side of the President's dark gray suit.

From the telephone car, I had radioed the Dallas bureau of UPI that three shots had been fired at the Kennedy motorcade. Seeing the bloody scene in the rear of the car at the hospital entrance, I knew I had to get to a telephone immediately.

Clint Hill, the Secret Service agent in charge of the detail assigned to Mrs. Kennedy, was leaning over in the rear of the car.

"How badly was he hit, Clint?" I asked.

"He's dead," Hill replied curtly.

I have no further clear memory of the scene in the driveway. I recall a babble of anxious voices, tense voices—"Where in hell are the stretchers. . . . Get a doctor out here. . . . He's on the way. . . . Come on, easy there." And from somewhere, nervous sobbing.

I raced down a short stretch of sidewalk into a hospital corridor. The first thing I spotted was a small clerical office, more of a booth than an office. Inside, a bespectacled man stood shuffling what appeared to be hospital forms. At a wicket much like a bank teller's cage, I spotted a telephone on the shelf.

"How do you get outside?" I gasped. "The President has been hurt and this is an emergency call."

"Dial nine," he said, shoving the phone toward me.

It took two tries before I successfully dialed the Dallas UPI number. Quickly I dictated a bulletin saying the President had been seriously, perhaps fatally, injured by an assassin's bullets while driving through the streets of Dallas.

Litters bearing the President and the Governor rolled by me as I dictated, but my back was to the hallway and I didn't see them until they were at the entrance of the emergency room about 75 or 100 feet away.

A SWIFT AND CONFUSED PANORAMA

I knew they had passed, however, from the horrified expression that suddenly spread over the face of the man behind the wicket.

As I stood in the drab buff hallway leading into the emergency ward trying to reconstruct the shooting for the UPI man on the other end of the telephone and still keep track of what was happening outside the door

of the emergency room, I watched a swift and confused panorama sweep before me.

Kilduff of the White House press staff raced up and down the hall. Police captains barked at each other, "Clear this area." Two priests hurried in behind a Secret Service agent, their narrow purple stoles rolled up tightly in their hands. A police lieutenant ran down the hall with a large carton of blood for transfusions. A doctor came in and said he was responding to a call for "all neurosurgeons."

The priests came out and said the President had received the last sacrament of the Roman Catholic Church. They said he was still alive, but not conscious. Members of the Kennedy staff began arriving. They had been behind us in the motorcade, but hopelessly bogged for a time in confused traffic.

Telephones were at a premium in the hospital and I clung to mine for dear life. I was afraid to stray from the wicket lest I lose contact with the outside world.

My decision was made for me, however, when Kilduff and Wayne Hawks of the White House staff ran by me, shouting that Kilduff would make a statement shortly in the so-called nurses room a floor above and at the far end of the hospital.

I threw down the phone and sped after them. We reached the door of the conference room and there were loud cries of "Quiet!" Fighting to keep his emotions under control, Kilduff said "President John Fitzgerald Kennedy died at approximately one o'clock."

I raced into a nearby office. The telephone switchboard at the hospital was hopelessly jammed. I spotted Virginia Payette, wife of UPI's Southwestern division manager and a veteran reporter in her own right. I told her to try getting through on pay telephones on the floor above.

POLICE CLEAR HOLE IN TRAFFIC

Frustrated by the inability to get through the hospital switchboard, I appealed to a nurse. She led me through a maze of corridors and back stairways to another floor and a lone pay booth. I got the Dallas office. Virginia had gotten through before me.

Whereupon I ran back through the hospital to the conference room. There Jiggs Fauver of the White House transportation staff grabbed me and said Kilduff wanted a pool of three men immediately to fly back to Washington on Air Force One, the Presidential aircraft.

"He wants you downstairs, and he wants you right now," Fauver said.

Down the stairs I ran and into the driveway, only to discover Kilduff had just pulled out in our telephone car.

Charles Roberts of Newsweek magazine, Sid Davis of Westinghouse Broadcasting and I implored a police officer to take us to the airport in his squad car. The Secret Service had requested that no sirens be used in the vicinity of the airport, but the Dallas officer did a masterful job of getting us through some of the worst traffic I've ever seen.

As we piled out of the car on the edge of the runway about 200 yards from the Presidential aircraft, Kilduff spotted us and motioned for us to hurry. We trotted to him and he said the plane could take two

pool men to Washington; that Johnson was about to take the oath of office aboard the plane and would take off immediately thereafter.

I saw a bank of telephone booths beside the runway and asked if I had time to advise my news service. He said, "But for God's sake, hurry."

Then began another telephone nightmare. The Dallas office rang busy. I tried calling Washington. All circuits were busy. Then I called the New York bureau of UPI and told them about the impending installation of a new President aboard the airplane.

Kilduff came out of the plane and motioned wildly toward my booth. I slammed down the phone and jogged across the runway. A detective stopped me and said, "You dropped your pocket comb."

Aboard Air Force One on which I had made so many trips as a press association reporter covering President Kennedy, all of the shades of the larger main cabin were drawn and the interior was hot and dimly lighted.

Kilduff propelled us to the President's suite two-thirds of the way back in the plane. The room is used normally as a combination conference and sitting room and could accommodate eight to ten people seated.

MRS. KENNEDY ALONE

I wedged inside the door and began counting. There were 27 people in this compartment. Johnson stood in the center with his wife, Lady Bird. U.S. District Judge Sarah T. Hughes, 67, a kindly faced woman stood with a small black Bible in her hands, waiting to give the oath.

The compartment became hotter and hotter. Johnson was worried that some of the Kennedy staff might not be able to get inside. He urged people to press forward, but a Signal Corps photographer, Capt. Cecil Stoughton, standing in the corner on a chair, said if Johnson moved any closer, it would be virtually impossible to make a truly historic photograph.

It developed that Johnson was waiting for Mrs. Kennedy, who was composing herself in a small bedroom in the rear of the plane. She appeared alone, dressed in the same pink wool suit she had worn in the morning when she appeared so happy shaking hands with airport crowds at the side of her husband.

She was white-faced but dry-eyed. Friendly hands stretched toward her as she stumbled slightly. Johnson took both of her hands in his and motioned her to his left side. Lady Bird stood on his right, a fixed half-smile showing the tension.

Johnson nodded to Judge Hughes, an old friend of his family and a Kennedy appointee.

"Hold up your right hand and repeat after me," the woman jurist said to Johnson.

Outside a jet could be heard droning into a landing. Judge Hughes held out the Bible and Johnson covered it with his large left hand. His right arm went slowly into the air and the jurist began to intone the Constitutional oath, "I do solemnly swear I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States . . ."

The brief ceremony ended when Johnson in a deep, firm voice, repeated after the judge, ". . . and so help me God."

Johnson turned first to his wife, hugged her about the shoulders and kissed her on the cheek. Then he turned to Kennedy's widow, put his left arm around her and kissed her cheek.

As others in the group—some Texas Democratic House members, members of the Johnson and Kennedy staffs—moved toward the new President, he seemed to back away from any expression of felicitation.

The two-minute ceremony concluded at 3:38 P.M. EST and seconds later, the President said firmly, "Now, let's get airborne."

MRS. KENNEDY SITS BESIDE COFFIN

Col. James Swindal, pilot of the plane, a big gleaming silver and blue fan-jet, cut on the starboard engines immediately. Several persons, including Sid Davis of Westinghouse, left the plane at that time. The White House had room for only two pool reporters on the return flight and these posts were filled by Roberts and me, although at the moment we could find no empty seats.

At 3:47 P.M. EST, the wheels of Air Force One cleared the runway. Swindal roared the big ship up to an unusually high cruising altitude of 41,000 feet where at 625 miles an hour, ground speed, the jet hurtled toward Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington.

When the President's plane reached operating altitude, Mrs. Kennedy left her bedchamber and walked to the rear compartment of the plane. This was the so-called family living room, a private area where she and Kennedy, family and friends had spent many happy airborne hours chatting and dining together.

Kennedy's casket had been placed in this compartment, carried aboard by a group of Secret Service agents.

Mrs. Kennedy went into the rear lounge and took a chair beside the coffin. There she remained throughout the flight. Her vigil was shared at times by four staff members close to the slain chief executive—David Powers, his buddy and personal assistant; Kenneth P. O'Donnell, appointments secretary and key political adviser; Lawrence O'Brien, chief Kennedy liaison man with Congress, and Brig. Gen. Godfrey McHugh, Kennedy's Air Force aide.

Kennedy's military aide, Maj. Gen. Chester V. Clifton, was busy most of the trip in the forward areas of the plane, sending messages and making arrangements for arrival ceremonies and movement of the body to Bethesda Naval Hospital.

As the flight progressed, Johnson walked back into the main compartment. My portable typewriter was lost somewhere around the hospital and I was writing on an over-sized electric typewriter which Kennedy's personal secretary, Mrs. Evelyn Lincoln, had used to type his speech texts.

Johnson came up to the table where Roberts and I were trying to record the history we had just witnessed.

"I'm going to make a short statement in a few minutes and give you copies of it," he said. "Then when I get on the ground, I'll do it over again."

It was the first public utterance of the new Chief Executive, brief and moving:—

"This is a sad time for all people. We have suffered

a loss that cannot be weighed. For me it is a deep personal tragedy. I know the world shares the sorrow that Mrs. Kennedy and her family bear. I will do my best. That is all I can do. I ask for your help—and God's."

BROTHER RIDES IN HEARSE

When the plane was about 45 minutes from Washington, the new President got on a special radio-telephone and placed a call to Mrs. Rose Kennedy, the late President's mother.

"I wish to God there was something I could do," he told her, "I just wanted you to know that."

Then Mrs. Johnson wanted to talk to the elder Mrs. Kennedy.

"We feel like the heart has been cut out of us," Mrs. Johnson said. She broke down for a moment and began to sob. Recovering in a few seconds, she added, "Our love and our prayers are with you."

Thirty minutes out of Washington, Johnson put in a call for Nellie Connally, wife of the seriously wounded Texas Governor.

The new President said to the Governor's wife:

"We are praying for you, darling, and I know that everything is going to be all right, isn't it? Give him a hug and a kiss for me."

It was dark when Air Force One began to skim over the lights of the Washington area, lining up for a landing at Andrews Air Force Base. The plane touched down at 5:59 P.M. EST.

I thanked the stewards for rigging up the typewriter for me, pulled on my raincoat and started down the forward ramp. Roberts and I stood under a wing and watched the casket being lowered from the rear of the plane and borne by a complement of armed forces body bearers into a waiting hearse. We watched Mrs. Kennedy and the President's brother, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy, climb into the hearse beside the coffin.

The new President repeated his first public statement for broadcast and newsreel microphones, shook hands with some of the government and diplomatic leaders who turned out to meet the plane, and headed for his helicopter.

Roberts and I were given seats on another 'copter bound for the White House lawn. In the compartment next to ours in one of the large chairs beside a window sat Theodore C. Sorensen, one of Kennedy's closest associates with the title of special counsel to the President. He had not gone to Texas with his chief but had come to the air base for his return.

Sorensen sat wilted in the large chair, crying softly. The dignity of his deep grief seemed to sum up all of the tragedy and sadness of the previous six hours.

As our helicopter circled in the balmy darkness for a landing on the White House south lawn, it seemed incredible that only six hours before, John Fitzgerald Kennedy had been a vibrant, smiling, waving and active man.

LEFTIST ACCUSED

Figure in Pro-Castro Group Is Charged— Policeman Slain

DALLAS, Nov. 21.—President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was shot and killed by an assassin today.

He died of a wound in the brain caused by a rifle bullet that was fired at him as he was riding through downtown Dallas in a motorcade.

Vice President Lyndon Barnes Johnson, who was riding in the third car behind Mr. Kennedy's, was sworn in as the 36th President of the United States 69 minutes after Mr. Kennedy's death.

Mr. Johnson is 55 years old; Mr. Kennedy was 46.

Shortly after the assassination, Lee H. Oswald, described as a one-time defector to the Soviet Union, active in the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, was arrested by the Dallas police. Tonight he was accused of the killing.

Senator Mike Mansfield of Montana, the Democratic leader, made the motion.

Senator Wayne Morse, Ore., said just before the Senate recessed, "if there ever was a hour when Americans should pray, this is it."

Without mentioning the name of the slain President, Mansfield went through the normal motions of legislation before asking the recess.

At the Interior Department, news bulletins of the shooting were posted in a corridor and hundreds of employees crowded in to read the latest information.

Similar situations existed in other Government departments which receive news service directly through the press.

N.Y. Exchange Closes
As Key Stock Day
New York (AP)—The New York Stock Exchange closed at 119 p. m. C. S. T. for the day.

Gunman Fires at Car, Texas Governor Also Is Cut Down by Bullets

Dallas, Tex. (UPI)—President Kennedy was shot and fatally wounded by an assassin Friday as he drove through downtown Dallas in an open car with Texas Gov. John B. Connally. He died in less than an hour.

Two priests who were called to give him the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church told reporters that Mr. Kennedy had died at 1 p. m. (CST). Government sources confirmed this.

The priests came out of the ward at approximately 1:37 p. m. (CST).

The announcement by the priests brought audible sobs from a crowd of scores of newsmen and other citizens crowded around the emergency ward entrance.

The President and Governor were rushed to the hospital with Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, who was in the same car, cradling her husband's head in her lap. He was shot in the right temple.

Minutes after the shooting a Secret Service man was heard to say: "He's dead."

An assistant to Governor Connally said he talked to the Governor in the hospital operating room. He said the Governor was shot just below the shoulder blade in the back and in a serious condition.

He said he asked Mr. Connally how it happened and he said:

"I don't know, I guess from the back. They got the President."

Mrs. Connally was also in the famous bulletproof car. The top was down. Neither of the women were hurt.

The Secret Service men, who are constantly at the president's side, witnessed automatic weapons and drew pistols but it was too late.

The incident occurred just past an underpass facing a public park in downtown Dallas.

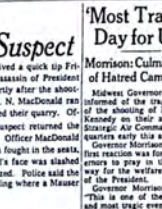

JFK Lashes Critics In 'Campaign' Style

The President, cradled in his wife's arms, had been parked in his blood-spattered limousine to Parkland Hospital and taken to an emergency room. An urgent call went out for neurosurgeons and blood.

The President, 66 years old, was shot once in the head. Connally was hit in the back and wrist.

Vice President Lyndon Johnson was in the same motorcade and was immediately surrounded by Secret Service men until he could take the oath of office as President.

Police found a foreign-made rifle. Sheriff's officers were questioning a young man picked up at the scene.

The President was conscious as he arrived at the hospital. Father Huber from Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church was called and administered the last rites of the church.

Johnson, who now becomes President of the United States, was in a car behind the Kennedys and Connally. He rushed to the hospital and was whisked away by Secret Service. His whereabouts were kept secret.

Throughout the trip, when Kennedy and Johnson had been in the same motorcade they have ridden in separate cars as an obvious security measure. The Kennedys had planned to spend the night at Johnson's home.

The top of the famous bulletproof car was down. Neither of the women appeared to have been hurt, at least not seriously.

Three gunbursts of fire, apparently from automatic weapons, were heard.

The Secret Service men, who are constantly at the President's side, lowered automatic weapons and drew pistols but it was too late.

The shooting occurred just east of an intersection. (Continued on Page 3, Column 2)

The President, 46 years old, was shot once in the head. Connally was hit in the head and wrist.

Police found a foreign-made rifle. Sheriff's

officers were questioning a young man picked up at the scene.

THE PRESIDENT WAS CONSCIOUS as he arrived at the hospital. Father figure from holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church was called and administered the last rites of the church.

Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, who now becomes President of the United States, was in a car behind the Kennedy and Connally.

He was to swim into office as soon as possible.

He rushed to the hospital and was whisked away by Secret Service men. His whereabouts was being kept secret.

MRS. KENNEDY WAS STILL at the hospital.

She was not shot. The White House spokesman refused to comment on her condition.

PRESIDENT KENNEDY WAS shot in the right temple.

"It was a simple matter of a bullet right through the head," said Dr. George Burkley, White House medical officer.

Kennedy died less than an hour after the shot was fired.

Gov. Connally underwent an operation for a gunshot wound in the chest at 2:30 p.m. (UPI).

Connally's condition was said to be serious. But he said that while the governor "was not out of the woods, his doctors said his vital signs were good."

But he said the doctor said Connally had a good pulse and that his respiration was satisfactory.

"Take care of Nellie" (his wife), Connally ground out an aside.

JOHNSON LEFT THE HOSPITAL moments after he was informed of the President's death.

Traveling behind a police escort, with his wife, Lady Bird, Johnson headed under heavy guard for various meetings in midtown Dallas.

Presumably Johnson and his staff will go right to work on plans for taking a formal oath of office to succeed the slain President.

THE SHOOTING OCCURRED as Kennedy and his wife, along with Gov. Connally and Mrs. Connally, were riding in the White House limousine through a crowd of 50,000 people on downtown Dallas.

As it passed the triple underpass leading toward the Trade Mart where Kennedy was to address a lunch, 200 Secret Service guards were ordered.

At the double underpass, motorcycle police rode along the gravelly curb of a park, mostly where a mass and woman were gathered.

There was pandemonium. The President's car cut out of the line of travel and faced behind screaming, motorcycle police riders in Parkland Hospital. Two fires were brought out by the President and the governor.

Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Connally appeared in shock.

The President lay face down on the floor of the limousine, which had its hoodly by Mrs. Johnson crumpled over him.

AT 1:10 P.M. (UPI), Mrs. Johnson was escorted by Secret Service agents into the emergency room where the President lay when he died. They did not know whether the vice president was in the room.

Mrs. Johnson said after a visit to the emergency operating room that she was greatly shocked. She said she was taken back into another first floor room where Johnson originally had gone.

Asked if her husband also had been wounded, she shook her head negatively.

Secret Service men pushed reporters away and permitted no more questions.

There was an unexplained report that Vice President Johnson had been wounded slightly. One reporter said he saw Johnson walk into the hospital building.

The Secret Service said the President remained in the emergency room and the governor was moved to the general operating room of Parkland Hospital.

One Secret Service man was overheard laughing and that there would be a trial because the President became an emergency facility were entirely adequate in the emergency room.

TWO ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIESTS were summoned to the emergency room where the President lay. One was identified as a Father Fisher.

Malcolm Kiddiff, acting White House press secretary, said that the two priests had been "asked for."

"What does this mean?" he was asked.

"I don't know," he said, "anything except that the priests were asked for."

Doctors here were quickly posted in the corridors leading to the emergency room, and Secret Service agents turned reporters back. He left them standing.

Bill Simmons, an assistant to Gov. Connally, said he talked to Johnson in the hospital operating room. He said Johnson was shot just before the underpass where the President was to address a lunch, 200 Secret Service guards were ordered.

"I don't know, I guess from the back. They got the President shot."

The last sacrament of the church was administered shortly before 1 p.m.

The chief priest, who declined to give his name, said the chief Executive will still give it to him.

BELL REPORTED THREE SHOTS were fired as the motorcade entered the triple underpass which leads to the Simmons Freeway route to Parkland Hospital.

Pandemonium broke loose around the car.

The Secret Service waded the motorcade on at top speed to the hospital.

Even at high speed it took only five minutes to get to the ambulance entrance of the hospital.

Reporters saw Kennedy lying flat on his back on the seat of the limousine.

He said a man and a woman were scrambling on the upper level of the triple underpass when the shooting started.

Mrs. Connally was wearing and trying to hold up her husband's shirt.

ASSASSINATION KILLS KENNEDY

Johnson Sworn In as President; Suspect in Slaying Captured

DALLAS, Nov. 22—President Kennedy was slain by an assassin today in a burst of gunfire in downtown Dallas, Texas Gov. John Connally was shot down with him.

First President Lyndon B. Johnson was sworn in as President of the United States at about 2:30 p. m. He took the oath aboard the

presidential plane as he was preparing to fly to Washington to take over the government. The plane took off immediately afterward.

The President, credited to his wife's arms, had been taken in his blood-splattered limousine to Parkland Hospital and to an emergency room there.

The President, 46, was shot once in the head. Connally was hit in the right shoulder.

The prime suspect was a man who was seized in a movie theater soon after the assassination. A man there had shot and killed a police officer before he was subdued.

The man was identified as Lee H. Oswald, 24, chairman of a Fair Play for Cuba committee. He was an employee in a building from which the shots were fired.

THE PRESIDENT WAS CONSCIOUS as he arrived at the hospital. The Rev. Oscar Huber from Holy Trinity Roman Catholic Church was called and administered the last rites of the church.

Kennedy lived less than an hour. Then came the announcement that the President was dead—the fourth United States President to be slain in a welcoming party.

As the shells cracked out, Mr. Kennedy fell face down in the back seat of his car. Blood was on his face. Kennedy cried, "Oh, my God," and tried to hold up his head.

Connally, remained half seated, slumped to the left. There was blood on his face and forehead.

Blood was spattered over the limousine, which had been blown in specially to carry the President in a welcoming parade. The driver was a Secret Service man, Bill Greer.

THE SHOOTING OCCURRED as Mr. Kennedy and his wife were riding with Governor and Mrs. Connally in the White House limousine through a crowd of 250,000 people in downtown Dallas.

As it entered the crowded street leading toward the Trade Mart, where Mr. Kennedy was to address a lunch three hours after the shooting.

Motorcycle police raced up the grassy neck of a park nearby, where a man and woman were huddled.

Governor Connally announced in "satisfactory" condition but in great pain. He underwent an emergency operation.

"Take care of Nellie," his wife, he gasped to an aide.

Johnson was in an automobile behind the Kennedy and Connally but he was kept to the rear.

He rushed to the hospital and was whisked away by the Secret Service after he was informed of the President's death.

Charles Brehan, 38, of Dallas, was standing in the big crowd at curbside about 15 feet away from the President's car as it approached.

"He was waving and the first shot hit him and that solid brass fired his life," Brehan said.

A TELEVISION NEWSMAN, Mal Couch, had looked up just after the shots were fired and saw a man withdraw from a fifth or sixth floor window of a nearby building (the Texas Book Depository).

The Dallas Sheriff's Department disclosed the death weapon as a 7.65 Mauser. The German-made rifle had a telescopic sight with one sharp end in the chamber. Three spent shells were found nearby.

The rifle was found near the alleyway and on the floor of the building. The assassin had been in the building some time and had been eating French fries.

PREPARATIONS WERE MADE almost immediately after the President's death to return his body to the White House.

The body was carried from the hospital in a casket called and placed in a hearse and the dressings were pulled. Mrs. Kennedy accompanied the body.

Mr. Kennedy's body was placed aboard the plane on which he would fly back to Washington, where it landed at 3:45 p. m. (Seattle time). Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Johnson were in the plane with the body.

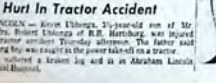

Mrs. Evelyn Lincoln, Mrs. Kennedy's secretary; Pamela Tanare, press secretary to Mrs. Kennedy, and other members of the staff were taken to a special waiting room not far from the emergency room area. Mrs. Lincoln broke into tears at one point, but managed to pull herself together and resume what appeared to be official duties.

Mrs. Johnson, flanked by two Secret Service agents, arrived at the hospital shortly after.

She walked at 1:10 p.m. and went immediately to the emergency ward.

Also standing by the door of the emergency section was Mrs. Mary Gallagher, personal secretary to Mrs. Kennedy.

President Dies of Wounds in Dallas, Texas

DALLAS — (UPI) — President Kennedy was assassinated today in burst of gunfire in Downtown Dallas. Texas Gov. John Connally was shot down with him.

The President, his limp body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The governor also was taken to Parkland.

The President was lifted from the rear of a White House touring car, the famous 'bubble top' from Washington. He was rushed to an emergency room in the hospital.

The incident occurred just east of the triple overpass facing a park in downtown Dallas.

Reporters about five car lengths behind the chief executive heard what sounded like three bursts of gunfire.

Television newsmen Mal Couch said he looked up just after the shot was fired and saw a rifle being withdrawn from a 5th or 6th floor window in a nearby building (the Texas Book Depository).

"A policeman fell to the ground and pulled his pistol and yelled, 'get down!'"

Secret Service agents in a follow-up car quickly unlimbered their automatic rifles.

The bubble top of the president's car was down.

The President was slumped over in the backseat of the car face down. Connally lay on the floor of the rear seat.

4 Presidents Have Been Slain In Office

The assassination of President John F. Kennedy this morning in Dallas is the fourth murder of a U.S. President in the nation's history.

In April, 1918, John Wilson, then president of the United States, was shot by a fanatic in the White House.

President James Garfield was shot by a disgruntled job seeker at a Washington railroad station on July 7, 1881. He died on July 19, 1881.

President William McKinley was shot by a fanatic in Buffalo, N.Y., on Sept. 6, 1901, and died on Sept. 14, 1901.

In addition, an attempt was made upon the lives of President Dwight D. Eisenhower in Miami, Fla., on Feb. 15, 1955. The would-be assassin, James Earl Ray, was shot and wounded Mayor John F. Kennedy in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963. Another attempt was made on Nov. 1, 1963, when two Puerto Rican assassins tried to shoot their way into the White House, Washington, where President Harry S. Truman was staying during remodeling of the White House.

President Roosevelt, while campaigning as an independent candidate for reelection, was shot by a would-be assassin while riding through Milwaukee, Wis. He ignored the wound and completed a speaking engagement before expiring and is believed to have been in a hospital for several days.

Sniper Kills JFK; Texas Leader Hit

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—President Kennedy has been assassinated.

He was killed today by a bullet in the head while riding in an open car through the streets of Dallas. His wife was in the same car, but was not hit. She credited the President in her arms as he was carried to a hospital where he died.

Vice President Lyndon Johnson was in the same motorcade and was immediately surrounded by Secret Service men until he could take the oath of office as president.

Gov. John B. Connally of Texas, beside the President in the car, was also hit by the assassin's bullet. Johnson was in the Parkland Hospital where Kennedy died. The vice president was in the same motorcade as it roared through crowds in the downtown streets but he was some distance back and not harmed.

Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy and Connally's wife were both in the same famous limousine—its protective glass shied down today.

AS ALWAYS, THE PRESIDENT was surrounded by Secret Service men and a crowd of Dallas onlookers piled in. The protective glass of the car was shot today as well as before his guests could see the president.

Charles Smith, 38, Dallas, was standing in the crowd at the time about 1 1/2 feet away from the president's car.

He was waving and the first shot hit him and the crowd behind him. Smith said he did not see the assassin. Exactly two weeks ago today, President Kennedy had observed the 40th anniversary of his election victory over Richard M. Nixon in the 1960 election.

The President was also seen in the head, the right eye. Connally was hit in the chest and arm.

The President was conscious as he arrived at the Parkland Hospital.

NEITHER WOMAN was believed hurt. Mrs. Kennedy screamed as she looked but never got out the back seat. She said she had to lie flat.

The last ride of the Roman Catholic Church was administered to the 45-year-old President at the Parkland Hospital.

The rifle was made in a store on the fifth floor of the building. The assistant had been in the building some time before the rifle was fired.

THE PRESIDENT had looked only a short time before at Dallas Love Field and said he was being driven to the airport. The flight was sponsored by three Dallas organizations.

The largest group was the Dallas Police. There were on the scene at least 2,000 people lined the streets.

Congolese eject Red diplomats

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—Congo police hunted a Soviet diplomat in the airport Thursday night and expelled him from the country. It was learned today.

The ousted official was embassy counselor Yuri Voronin, one of two Russian diplomats arrested Tuesday on charges of aiding a plot against the government.

Informal sources said Voronin was escorted to the Leopoldville airport by a heavy military guard and placed aboard an airplane by the Russians. The soldiers prevented anyone from approaching the plane.

The sources also said the diplomat arrested with Voronin, embassy counselor Yuri Makarenko, did not appear at the airport. Presumably, he was still in the country.

Theresa Premier Cyrille Adoula ordered his men out of the airport to prevent any attempt to free the diplomats. The Russian embassy maintains that 100 people in Leopoldville, including women and children.

In Moscow Thursday, Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko said the Soviet Union was a neutral power and would not take any action to prevent the departure of the diplomats.

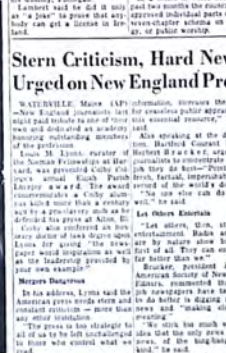

Volume for the day was estimated at 3.1 billion shares compared with 3.7 million on Thursday.
The market, which had been rising from a steep decline Thursday did a rapid turnaround. Prices of key stocks climbed on a broad front.
The Dow Jones industrial average which had been up 2.31 in 1963 at 1:30 p.m. EDT reversed itself and a half hour later showed a loss of 1.67 at 2:30.
Leads of about 2 were taken by AT&T and Chrysler. Ford slipped 6 points.
The shock about the Presidential assassination as the market was rallying in mid-afternoon was one of the two suspended bidrange firms had been reinstated. This was a reversal of a strong rally in a previously heavy and mixed market.
The closing of the stock exchange came with dramatic suddenness. On two past occasions, such as the outbreak of war, the stock exchange has shut down operations to prevent panic conditions.

Sniper's Bullets Cut Down President, Texas Governor

DALLAS, Tex. (UP) — President Kennedy has been assassinated.
He was killed today by a bullet in the head while riding in an open car through the streets of Dallas.
His wife was in the same car, but was not hit. She crashed the President in her arms as he was carried to a hospital where he died.
Vice President Lyndon Johnson was in the same motorcade and will immediately be surrounded by Secret Service men until he recedes to the oath of office as president.
Gov. John B. Connally of Texas, beside the President in the car, was also hit by the assassin's bullet. He was wounded in the back.
Johnson was in the Parkland Hospital where Kennedy died. The vice president was in the same motorcade as it sped through crowds in the downtown streets but he was some distance back and not harmed.

The President, his limo body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The governor also was taken to Parkland.
Clint Hill, a Secret Service agent assigned to Mrs. Kennedy, said "He died," as the President was lifted from the rear of a White House touring car, the famous "limousine" in Washington. He was rushed to an emergency room in the hospital.
Other White House officials were in doubt as to whether the White House officials were in doubt as to whether the incident occurred just east of the triple underpass facing a park in downtown Dallas.
Reporters about five car lengths behind the Chief Executive heard what sounded like three bursts of gunfire.
Secret Service agents in a follow-up car quickly unlimbered their automatic rifles. The bubble top of the President's car was down.
They drew their pistols, but the damage was done. The President was slumped over in the backseat of the car free down. Connally lay on the floor of the rear seat.
It was impossible to tell at all once where Kennedy was hit, but bullet wounds in Connally's chest were plainly visible, indicating the gunfire might possibly have come from an automatic weapon.

Dallas motorcycle officers securing the President quickly jumped from their bikes and ran up a grassy hill.
At the top of the hill, a man and woman appeared huddled on the ground.
In the turmoil, it was impossible to determine at once whether the Secret Service and Dallas police returned the gunfire that struck down Kennedy and Connally.
It was also difficult to determine immediately whether the First Lady and Mrs. Connally were injured.
Both women were cradled down over the inert forms of their husbands as the big car raced toward the hospital.
Mrs. Kennedy was on her knees on the floor of the rear seat with her hand toward the President.
Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson was in a car behind the President's.

There was no immediate sign that he was hurt. In fact, there was no evidence at all that might have happened to Johnson since only the President's car and its Secret Service follow-up car were in the hospital.
A screaming motorcycle escort led the cars there. The President had taken only a short time before at Dallas Love Field and was driving to the trade mart to deliver a lunch speech sponsored by three Dallas organizations.
The latest turnout of the current Texas tour was on the streets to greet Kennedy.
At 12:26 p.m. CST, Acting White House Secretary Malcolm Kilguff was asked whether the President was dead.
"I have no answer now," Kilguff replied.

Clear Cut Blurry Impossible
A few minutes later, Rear Adm. George Burkley, USN, the White House physician, rushed into the hospital. He was headed for the emergency room where the President and Connally were taken.
The motorcade was sprung out as the result of the speedy Secret Service departure from the scene of the shooting that members of the Kennedy staff were from 15 minutes to a half hour behind in reaching the hospital.
It was impossible under the tension at the hospital to assemble a clear-cut story of the incident because the burst of gunfire took only seconds.
A number of Secret Service agents thought the gunfire was from an automatic weapon fired to the right rear of the Chief Executive's car, probably from the grassy knoll to which motorcycle policemen directed their attention as they moved up the slope.
UPI White House reporter Merriman Smith was in a radio-telephone "pocket" car about eight car lengths behind the President.
He and three other reporters along with Kilguff rushed to the hospital behind the President's car and arrived at the emergency entrance before litter was brought up to remove the President and the governor from their car.
When the President was taken into the emergency room, a cell was set up immediately for some of the top surgical specialists in Dallas.
A cell also was set for a Roman Catholic priest. Congressman Jim Wright of Fort Worth said both Kennedy and Connally were seriously wounded but were alive.

JKF Slain in Dallas

DALLAS (UPI) — Police Friday seized Lee H. Oswald, identified as chairman of a "Fair Play for Cuba Committee," as the prime suspect in the assassination of President Kennedy.

A Dallas television reporter said he saw a rifle being withdrawn from a window on the fifth or sixth floor of an office building shortly after the gunfire.

The President was conscious as he arrived at the hospital. Father, Mrs. Henry, Roman Catholic Church was called and administered the last rights.

VICE PRESIDENT Johnson, who now becomes President of the United States, was in a car behind the Kennedys and Connally.

Johnson was under heavy guard and was whisked from the hospital by White House officials.

"IT WAS A simple matter of a bullet fired through the window," said Dr. George Burkley, White House medical officer.

The shooting occurred as Kennedy and his wife, riding with Gov. Connally and Mrs. Connally, were riding in the White House "limousine" limousine through a crowd of 500 people in downtown Dallas.

As it passed the triple underpass leading toward the Fair Trade market where Kennedy was to address a lunch, three bursts of gunfire sounded.

The Dallas Police Department identified the rifle as a T&D Mauser. The foreign-made rifle was found in the back of the car.

The rifle was found in a staircase on the fifth floor of the building. The assistant had been in the building at the time and was firing rifle.

CHARLES BREEM, 26, of Dallas was standing in the big crowd at curbside about 13 feet away as the President was shot.

"He was waving and the first shot hit him and that shot took care of his life," Breem said.

Connally was taken into surgery. His office said the six-year-old governor, who is Kennedy's Navy secretary before he ran for state office, was in surgery.

The President's body was carried from the hospital in a wooden casket.

Mrs. Kennedy was accompanying the body. Fifty 30-uniformed policemen surrounded the area, driving back hundreds of spectators surrounding the hospital.

THE CASKET was placed in a white Cadillac hearse and the drapes were pulled at a tremendous traffic jam developed around Parkland hospital.

White House officials, looking stunned, in corridors and in a waiting room.

At 12:30 p.m. a priest said Mrs. Kennedy was still alive. Then came the official announcement that John Fitzgerald Kennedy, President of the United States, was dead.

For almost an hour, rumors flew around the hospital about whether the President is alive.

He was shot as he rode in an open car in downtown Dallas, waving and smiling to a crowd of 250,000. Vice President Lyndon Johnson — the nation's new President — was in the same cavalcade but a number of car lengths behind. He was not hurt.

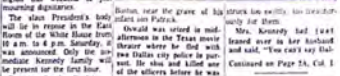

DALLAS, Tex. (AP)—Lee Harvey Oswald, charged with murdering President Kennedy, denied during hours of questioning Friday night that he was the assassin.

With his jaw thrust out and his dark eyes intent and piercing, Oswald kept telling newspapermen that he did not kill President Kennedy's body carrier. "I did not kill anyone. I don't know what this is all about."

After the formal charges were filed, Oswald was brought before newspapermen. Speaking in a low voice into a cluster of microphones, Oswald said he had no idea who was killing the President.

His appearance was so defiant that officers on the scene had to shoot at him several times as he was being questioned.

"I don't think it is a nut," said Atty. Henry Wade last evening. "I don't mean that he is a nut, I mean that he is a nutcase, very nutcase, and he is dangerous."

Secret Service agents, Dallas police and Texas National Guardsmen held Oswald for almost 18 hours before he was taken to the Dallas County Jail. He was charged with the assassination of President Kennedy.

Oswald was working on the floor crew of the Texas boat company, the floor from which the shots were fired. He was working with his uncle, "Dad," who was the President's body carrier.

Oswald replied: "No, you got down and saw the elevator. He was stopped by Dallas police. Oswald had been going down to see what was going on."

POLICEMAN SHOT
In the O. G. Cliff section of Dallas, four miles away, Oswald was seen 45 minutes later. He was shot in the back by a policeman. A witness said that Oswald suddenly turned and shot the officer.

Officers surrounded the brother, and his wife, when they spotted Oswald near the boat. He pulled out a pistol and fired. He failed to get off, and the officers jumped on him.

The Prayers Of Grieving Nation

Americans of all faiths and opinions will not wait until Monday to offer up their prayers for the soul of our dead President, John F. Kennedy, for his bereaved widow, children, parents, sisters, and brothers, and for the new President, Lyndon B. Johnson.

Our hearts go out to Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, who had suffered a great sorrow earlier this year and who, on Friday, had her vital young husband beside her, happy and triumphant as they received the homage of a vast multitude of Dallas admirers, and in the next moment saw him mortally stricken and held his bloody head in her lap as the car crashed then toward the hospital.

To recall a human agony comparable to hers, we have to go back to the crime at Sarajevo in late June, 1914, when a Serbian assassin killed the Austrian Archduke who was heir to the throne of a then great empire, and mortally wounded his wife who was beside him in an open touring car. He died imploring her to live for the sake of her children; she, holding him close to her, expired soon thereafter.

That crime led to World War I, the first great holocaust of our century. It unleashed human hatreds, angers and fears that nearly destroyed European civilization.

We may be thankful that in our United States people will not follow that hideous example but will go down on their knees in prayer to Almighty God. They will beseech Him to guide this great nation and to save us from divisive hatreds.

We are thankful to God that Mrs. Kennedy will live as the mother of her and the dead President's children; and that Governor Connally should recover from the serious wound which the assassin inflicted on him.

Sorrowful revulsion should be our feeling as we contemplate this criminal madman, who hooded upon a fancied grievance against the Marine Corps until it drove him into hatred of his native country, infatuation with Communism, and an obsession to kill the President and the former secretary of the Navy.

We pray that the horrible example of this young man may help to lead all living and future Americans to seek divine aid against the self-pity and anger that assail weak mortals.

We pray that the new President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson, be given strength and wisdom. He will have the support and prayers of the nation in the months ahead.

Let us become united in our prayers to Almighty God, who has helped this nation in every generation to find its strength in Him.

Johnson Takes Firm Government Grip

Policeman Says 'Case Is Cinched'

DALLAS (UPI)—Police said Saturday night they have an air-tight case against pro-Castro Marxist Lee Harvey Oswald, 24, as the assassin of President Kennedy, including photos of him holding the rifle.

Police were reported showing the photos to the sullen ex-Marine from suburban Irving, Tex., who has steadfastly maintained his innocence and has also denied slaying a Dallas policeman.

The photos, police said, show him with both the rifle used to kill President Kennedy and the pistol used to kill parking Patrolman J. D. Tippitt shortly after the assassination.

"This case is cinched," said homicide Chief Capt. Will Fritz.

When he was brought down from a cell in jail to a room where he was shown the photos, Oswald was the picture of confusion, anxious and badly trembling about prices received. When he was taken back to his cell he looked dejected.

"Yes, we have a picture of him with the rifle and with the pistol," Fritz said.

Police were reported having seen him several photographs.

Police Chief Jesse Curry reported that Oswald bought the .300 caliber Remington-Union City rifle with a telescopic sight from a Chicago mail order house for \$118.

The handwriting on the mail order was Oswald's, Curry said. Chicago police said they believed Dallas officers who reported Oswald after each Man Friday in all Catholic churches in Dallas was Oswald's, Curry said.

The new Chief Executive has invited "the people of the world who share our grief to join us in this day of mourning and remembrance."

BURIAL
The White House announced today that Mr. Kennedy would be buried in Arlington National Cemetery at the rank of the Kennedy family.

John Kennedy will become the second President to be buried in the wooded acres of the Nation's hallowed shrine. The first was William Howard Taft.

The body will be taken to Arlington after Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston, a friend of Mr. Kennedy's, officiates at a solemn Requiem Mass in St. Matthew's Cathedral Monday.

All Federal offices will be closed Monday. Mr. Johnson personally urged the American people to assemble in the Nation's churches, "there in new dawn in submission to the will of Almighty God, and in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit."

Pledges of Support By Nation's Leaders-- Congress Address Set

President Lyndon B. Johnson yesterday took over the powerful and complex machinery of government in his first full day as Chief Executive.

Mr. Johnson won strong pledges of support and unity from the late President Kennedy's cabinet and from American labor and business.

He will address a joint session of Congress on Wednesday, the White House announced last night. The address will be delivered at 12:30 p. m. EST (9:30 a. m. PST).

Earlier, a White House spokesman had said the address would be a plea for national unity. "I do not expect it to be a partisan speech," he added.

Cabinet

The new President presided over his first full-hour cabinet meeting a little more than 24 hours after John F. Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas.

He opened the session with a minute of silent prayer for his predecessor, whose body lay in the nearby East Room viewed by a parade of sorrowing Americans.

White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger said that Mr. Johnson told Mr. Kennedy's cabinet officers, including Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, "that he needed their help to the utmost."

Pledges

Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Alaska Governor, U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations, pledged the cabinet's support and assured Mr. Johnson they were ready to serve as long as he needed them.

Salinger also said that the President received similar pledges by telephone from AFL-CIO president George Meader, representing organized labor, and Frederick Kappel, president of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co., speaking for the Nation's business leaders.

Dallas police said yesterday they have an all-time case against Lee Harvey Oswald as the assassin of President Kennedy, including photos of him holding the rifle that was used.

Oswald, a 25-year-old ex-Marine and pro-Castro Marxist, has steadfastly maintained his innocence.

Police said the photos, found at Oswald's home, in Irving, Texas, show him with both a rifle of the type used by President Kennedy and the pistol of the type used to kill Patrick J. Tippit, who poisoned the assassin.

'CENCLER'

"This case is considered Captain Will Fritz, the Dallas homicide chief.

Oswald refused to take a lie detector test yesterday after paraffin tests showed "positive" traces of gunpowder on both his hands. Police said this indicated he had recently fired a rifle.

When he was brought down from a cell in City Jail to a room where he was shown the photos, Oswald looked confused. He was smiling and complaining loudly about prison treatment. When he was taken back up to his cell he looked disgruntled.

CARCANO

Police Chief Jesse Curry said the FBI had reported that Oswald bought the bullet that killed the Dallas rifle with a telescopic sight from a Chicago mail-order store for \$124. The rifle

WASHINGTON—(UPI)—John Fitzgerald Kennedy will be given a hero's burial tomorrow in Arlington National Cemetery after a Presidential Requiem Mass at noon.

In an official proclamation, one of his first acts as president, Lyndon B. Johnson declared tomorrow a day of national mourning for the president, killed by a sniper's bullet in an act that "outrages decent people."

The new President also appealed to the American people to assemble in their churches tomorrow for prayer, and invited all people anywhere who share this nation's grief on this day of mourning.

A little later the White House announced that the family of the slain President had decided on burial in the military cemetery in Arlington just across the Potomac River from the nation's capital.

Only one other president, William Howard Taft, is buried in Arlington, shrine of the nation's heroes.

MASS OFFICE

Richard Cardinal Cushing, Catholic archbishop of Boston, who will say the funeral Mass for Mr. Kennedy, will celebrate a nationally televised Requiem Mass at 11 a.m. (EST) today.

An avalanche of mail converged on the capital to pay homage yesterday, hundreds of people ranging from the family of the late President to the 100,000 men and women who served in the military. Many of the letters were addressed to the White House.

RIGHTEOUS FURY

Among them were two of the late President's most intense civil rights opponents, Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi and Sen. James O. Eastland of Mississippi. Wallace said the deaths of the man whose policies he denounced "frustrated all politics."

Tragic News Told To Elder Kennedy

BY HAVANUS POPE, Mass. Nov. 23—(AP)—The grief of a father who has lost a son named John to 29-year-old Joseph P. Kennedy, 27, was shared after the rest of the world knew of the President's assassination.

The tragic news had been passed physical conditions from a stroke suffered in December, 1951.

The younger of his two surviving sons—son Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass.—broke the news to his ailing father in an upstairs bedroom of the man's home in the Kennedy Cape Cod Compound.

300,000 See Body Borne To Capitol

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (UPI)—John Fitzgerald Kennedy lay in state in the rotunda of the floodlit U. S. Capitol Sunday night and the people paid him mournful homage.

They filed past the fringed draped casket by the thousands. At one time, as darkness fell, the patient lying waiting to pay their respects extended at least two miles.

Some had been standing in line—six and eight abreast—for six hours when finally they reached the Bier.

Most if not all had been through the ethnically mixed crowd which lined the procession route as, to the music of a march of martial drums, the body of the martyred President was borne from the White House to the Capitol.

Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, white and in black, frequently wiped her eyes during the occasion of ceremonies within the great rotunda.

With tears near but never shed and with her hand clasped in prayer, she walked to the Bier, bowed her head and kissed the center of the covering flag.

John F. Kennedy, Jr. who will be three years old Monday on the day his father is funeral, was not so self-disciplined as his mother and sister. He stood quietly for a while but after a time he turned and tried to make friends with some nearby. A Naval aide led him away.

Cursing Cafe Man Blasts Assassin Suspect in City Hall

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 21 (UPI)—Lee Harvey Oswald, accused assassin of President Kennedy, was himself shot and killed in vengeance Sunday afternoon by a self-appointed executioner who was an ardent admirer of the late Chief Executive.

The shooting was witnessed by millions of grieving Americans on their television screens.

Oswald, 24, was being transferred under heavy guard from the city jail in the Dallas City Hall and television cameras were trained on him when he was mortally wounded.

Jack Ruby, 52, portly, balding and hot-tempered operator of a Dallas striptease club, slipped through a heavy security police guard and fired a single shot from a snub-nose revolver into Oswald's chest just below the heart.

The pro-Castro, pro-Communist exile stumbled to the floor, fatally wounded. He was rushed to Parkland Memorial Hospital where John Fitzgerald Kennedy died Friday of two bullet wounds in the brain and throat.

12 SURGEONS WORK IN VAIN

The shooting occurred shortly before 12:30 P. M. EST. Oswald died at 2:07 P. M. after 12 surgeons fought to save him on an operating table just 10 feet from the room in which the Nation's 35th President died.

Although Oswald denied any connection with the Kennedy assassination, a few cheers broke out among witnesses in the basement of the city jail after he was shot.

Oswald said "absolutely nothing before or after he was shot," said Dallas homicide chief Will Fritz. Doctors attending the dying man said he groaned.

DALLAS (UPI)—Lee Harvey Oswald, accused slayer of President Kennedy, was hurried out of Dallas Sunday by well-appointed executives who carried him via helicopter to his new place of housing, a gray American who worked it as a pilot.

Oswald, 24, matched to the notes of police officers guarding him for a scheduled transfer from city jail to a maximum security jail, was fatally shot before the flight by a single 24 caliber bullet from a .30-caliber, Graham-Whitmore Ruby, wearing a white hat and a dark suit, was captured through an army of police shortly before 11:30 a. m. CST (12:30 p. m. EST) and after the nation's first President.

"A man of a habit," he shouted, firing the single shot as doctors said Oswald died within a few minutes. He was killed by Jack Ruby, 32, operator of a Dallas strip-tease nightclub and an armed officer of the Texas John Edgar Hoover.

'Eternal' Flame At Grave Site

ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY (UPI)—America buried John Fitzgerald Kennedy on Arlington's green slopes today, consigning his body to the land he loved and his soul to the God he worshipped.

After the last rites of a funeral Mass that broke the composure of his grieving widow, the martyred President was borne across the Potomac River to the national shrine of honored dead.

There, before the stricken family and before foreign presidents and guests, he found his final rest. An eternal light will burn at the tomb looking out on the Lincoln Memorial.

An estimated 800,000 hushed mourners lined the streets to pay their respects as the slain President was

Heads of State

Joining the family and all America in its grief were kings, presidents, ministers and princes from nearly every country of the world. Communal as well as few, from Charles de Gaulle of France to Anastas Mikoyan of Russia.

At the grave site, the farewell of "Eyes" mourning across the Virginia mountainside and the crash of 1000 caskets in final salute consumed a day of weeping. The sounds, since all mourners those who had refused to believe the young President was dead.

Others wept openly or within.

Under many, cloudless skies, but with a chill to the air, the young dead President then was taken across the river and into the trees of Arlington.

Cardinal Offers

There, in snowless fairs, Bishop Cardinal Cushing of Boston, who had married "Jack" Kennedy and his beautiful bride 10 years ago, commended his soul to God.

"Let his soul and all the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace," the Archbishop prayed.

At the Mass the Cardinal also led without the remaining words and promises of the church.

"Life is not taken away . . . but it is not changed."

Through the funeral hours, bells at churches of every faith were tolled in solemnity.

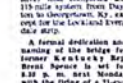

Russians See Kennedy Rites On Television

Nina Khrushchev Weeps As Soviets Pay Respects

MOSCOW (AP)—Nina Khrushchev, with tears in her eyes, wept as the Soviet television screen showed the funeral services Monday for President Kennedy.

But as the wife of the premier and Russian minister, the Communist propaganda machine continued to denounce the killing of Lee Harvey Oswald as part of a right-wing plot that had been hatched for years.

Russians in Moscow watched Kennedy's funeral on television through the Polish satellite, some Russians turned out during the day for American funeral services for Americans and members of the diplomatic corps.

Diplomatic services here, which were held in the Soviet Union, also had been held on Saturday, she called as Russian Ambassador U.S. Ambassador Foy Kohler.

As the head of the American-Soviet Friendship Society, she met the ambassador and Mrs. Kohler for 15 minutes and signed a book of condolences.

She came out arm in arm with Mrs. Kohler and was glimpsed in her eyes. The two women flew together.

Soviet propaganda expressed doubt and suspicion about the slaying of Oswald, 31, and suggested that he was guilty of assassinating the president. Her remarks were a complete coverage of the two assassination killings.

And Now He Rests Among The Heroes

ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY—(UPI)—Under a bright and cloudless sky, John Fitzgerald Kennedy went to rest today on a grassy hillside in this cemetery reserved for the nation's heroes.

There was a 21-gun salute for the young leader who fell under an assassin's bullet Friday, Rifleman fired three volleys. A leader smiled "Eagle."

ON NEARBY SLOPES were thousands of other heroes who died in their country's wars.

Present in life were his widow, friend and brother, and his little children, Caroline and John Jr.

Also present was the new President, Lyndon B. Johnson, and the kings and presidents and princes and ministers of most of the world's other nations.

A short time earlier, in Washington's old rose-red St. Matthew's Cathedral, the martyred President's soul was commended to the care and mercy of God.

THESE HIS WIDOW and children and his mother and all the others had heard this been asked of God: "May the angels take him into paradise."

Police Chief Robert V. Murray estimated 80,000 turned out to view the public part of the procession.

Last rites for the assassinated President were conducted by Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston.

Kennedy's flag-draped casket was borne to the cathedral from the White House, six blocks away, by the same horse-drawn caisson that brought the body to the capital building.

Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy followed on foot behind the caisson.

Walking behind her, as the somber cortege of muffled drums, were President Lyndon B. Johnson, former Presidents Dwight D. Eisenhower and Harry S. Truman, foreign heads of state and other dignitaries.

The "rest in peace" mass for America's first Roman Catholic President was officiated by the presence of 200,000 had come from near and far.

"LIFE IS NOT taken away," he said in St. Matthew's, which was Kennedy's parish church, as he said in the cathedral. "The spirit of the man lives on in the hearts of the people."

"The President, we believe, has gone to the next world."

ACROSS ARIZONA, members of Kennedy's countrymen said their own prayers for the repose of his soul.

St. Matthew's, which was Kennedy's parish church, is a 200-year-old building, spanning over 1800, is situated in the city of the "Desert, John F. Kennedy."
